Monday, Dec. 6 is *St. Nicholas feast day*. St. Nicholas was a Catholic bishop who helped the needy. He was born around 280 in an area of present-day Turkey. He lost both of his parents as a young man and reportedly used his inheritance to help the poor and sick. A devout Christian, he later served as bishop of Myra, a city that is now called Demre. After his death, the legend of his gift-giving grew. The people of Holland developed many of the traditions around St. Nicholas. It was that country who celebrated St. Nicholas on December 6 and have their children put out their shoes and receive some goodies from "Sint Nikolaas" (Dutch for St. Nicholas. Dutch immigrants



brought their tradition to America in the 1700's. At St. Mary's we continue the tradition! The students will place one of their shoes in the hallway and they will receive a special *surprise* in their shoes from St. Nick!

- Q. How will we know if school is closed due to the weather?
- A. Basically, if Moscow School District is closed due to treacherous road conditions, we will be closed too. See the Family Handbook for specific details of how the school will alert families.
- Q. When is the last day to sell raffle tickets?
- A. Friday, December 17th
- Q Will there be a family rosary in December?
- A. Not this month. The next one will be in January 2022.
- Q. Why are there ladders alongside of the school?
- A. Debbie Johnson, our Facilities Manager who is dealing with this wanted you to know the following: Scaffolding can be seen on the south side of the school to repair roof ice damage sustained during the winter of 2019-2020. We recently received permission from the insurance company to proceed with the needed repairs and to alleviate further damage we are proceeding with exterior repairs. New roofing shingles, new plywood, two coats of sealant, and new heat tape should be completed this week. Interior work and gutter replacement will be ongoing. All work will be completed with minimal interruption to school activities.
- Q. We know there is not a Christmas Play this year, but the calendar has a *possible* instrument/choir concert. Will this be happening?
- A. No, due to the restrictions surrounding the pandemic of the number allowed to gather; playing and singing in large numbers that one of our programs bring together with the lack of ventilation. We shall see what the Spring will bring!
- Q. Does the school do safety drills with the students?
- A. Yes, we do. We are required to do a Fire Drill monthly. This past month the school was evacuated in 80 seconds.
 - We also do "lockdown" drills throughout the school year. This week we will be doing one. We go on the PA to announce the lockdown. The teachers know where the students are to be placed

within the area they are safely and away from doors, windows, etc. The doors are locked; shades down etc. Under no circumstances do they open the doors until the doors are unlocked by a person in authority. All do a very good job safety wise. We pray we'll never have to do either one in reality!

- Q. Will there be childcare during the Christmas break December 20 through the 31st.
- A. No, there won't be any childcare at the school.
- Q Is it true that families are being charged for getting a mask from the school office?
- A. The only ones being charged for a mask are those students who come to the school office three to five times every week asking for a mask. The occasional student who needs a mask there is no charge. This charge is only those who consistently needs a mask from the office (3 to 5 times weekly).
- Q We notice that this year we have fundraising coordinators. Why has this been done?
- A. Fundraising efforts are key to assisting the school financially yearly. The cost to educate *every student* this year is \$7200. And 80% of the budget is salaries and benefits. We must have ways to cover the gap of tuition charged and actual cost. We have several ways of doing this. However, a *major* way is fundraisers. In the past, we have relied greatly on staff and "volunteers" to make the fundraisers work. We have chosen to do what many schools have done which is to actually make this a "position". Dianna Spellman and Natalie Johnson were the team (along with a great volunteer group) that made the Auction work so well last year. They asked about becoming the school's fundraiser coordinators. We are grateful to the great job that Dianna and Natalie are doing together as a team to raise the fundraising monies *along with each of you, parents, for the sake of the education of your child(dren)!!!*

By them taking on the task of coordinating the fundraisers, it has "freed" staff to cover other important areas in the school. Example: Debbie Johnson in addition to being the Office Manager is now "free" to focus on being the Facilities Manager in the school. This area covers dealing with keeping the school facilities in top shape: contracts dealing with maintenance, repairs, equipment, etc. in the school.

Eucharistic Adoration for children has started *at school*. This means students are welcomed and allowed to spend time with Jesus in His presence of the Eucharist. And this presence is in our school in the library. Father Joe, our pastor, spent time with each grade explaining what Eucharistic adoration is. Each student was very attentive. This first week has been very special. The students, especially in the older grades, as they have finished their work have taken time just to be with Jesus. Mr. Herrenbruck, upper grades religion teacher, who has taken his students in the past to church for adoration told us that having the Eucharistic presence in the school has been even more special due to the intimate setting and feeling of closeness to Jesus. This has been very special for all of the school. We are truly blessed!
